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Introduction

On 6 July 2017, 12 librarians participated in a conversation about how a united library field can tackle the challenges of the future. Together we represent 257 years of library experience.

The participants consisted of members of the Standing Committee of IFLA Library and Research Services for Parliaments Section. The discussions and answers reflect a general, as well as a parliamentary perspective.

A vision for libraries

Libraries enable literate, informed and participative societies. When we look at the future, according to the debates, the participants expressed the following views on the future of libraries;

In the year 2027, libraries are..

- consulted/partners on important issues affecting literacy, information access, education, etc;
- ...still here, still used, still relevant;
- a safe space to discover connect and inspire;
- in a leadership role for innovation, justice, and advancement of society;
- the institutions that guarantee access to the information society for all;
- independent institutions supporting and ensuring democracy, equal rights and access;
- interconnected and transformed with ICT tools to meet new clients needs;
- promoting reading culture, especially through Literacy programmes for all ages in relevant format and medium;
- institutions which guarantee the access for information and knowledge to all;
- institutions that will play an important role to promote objective and authoritative information in the face of the growing phenomenon of fake news and misleading information and to protect cultural heritage.

The core values of libraries (Q4):

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1. objective and authoritative information
 2. equal access to information
 3. community / service focus
 4. responsive to user needs
 5. integrity and trust

Libraries are exceptionally good at (Q5):

1. Providing access to information and knowledge
2. Organising and managing information
3. Outreach to clients, adapting to clients' needs
4. Providing a social hub & bringing people together
5. Educating and training

1. Outreach to community
2. Training and motivate staff
3. Experiment with technology
4. Develop new skills in staff
5. Be innovative

1. Resisting and fearing change
2. Maintaining redundant services
3. Doing what others do better
4. Be passive / navel-gazing
5. Second-guessing users' needs / expectations

Challenges and solutions

The main challenges to society (Q8):

1. Human crisis (war, poverty etc)
2. Failure of democracy (corruption, misinformation, etc)
3. Lack of equality (gender, digital, uneven access to opportunities etc)
4. The digital divide, lack of education
5. Terrorism, nationalism, radicalism

The main challenges to libraries (Q9):

1. Keeping up with changing requirements
2. Finding unique role that adds value, staying relevant
3. Decreased funding levels, low level of political support
4. Misinformation, inaccurate or deliberately misleading information, 'fake' news, etc.
5. Changing political environment

The main professional challenges (Q10):

1. New services require new staff skills - training
2. ICT/Digital capacity
3. Visibility of profession
4. Flexibility and necessity to adapt
5. Doing more with less
