English newspapers began in 1620

- Content limited to foreign news
- Taxed placed on each sheet

London Gazette

- Oldest surviving English newspaper
- Oldest published newspaper in the UK
- 1st published 7 Nov 1665
- Originally called The Oxford Gazette

Boston News-Letter

- 1st official US newspaper in 1704

 - -Births, Deaths, Marriages for Gentry
- 1800s: Morning Newspapers
 - Births, Deaths, Marriages for Ordinary individuals
 - List key milestones

Merriam-Webster's Definition

"A set of large sheets of paper that have news

stories, information about local events,

advertisements, etc., and that are folded

together and sold every day or every week."



Why Search Newspapers?

• The major themes of the study are the effect of newspapers on individual readers, society in general, and the political world on both sides of the Atlantic. Thus, the newspapers became mirrors of the society in which they were produced and help show the differences that developed in Britain and America

Wakefield Trial

LENT ASSIZES.

LANCASTER, FRIDAY, MARCH 28.

This trial, which has alternately excited so much public curiosity and disappointment, owing to the repeated postponements that have occurred, came on in the Civil Court, before

Mr. Baron HULLOCK, on Friday morning.

Before half-past six o'clock, the principal entrance to the Cantle was occupied by the witnesses in the cause, who were entitled to a priority of entrance; and at a quarter before seven o'clock, all those who had tickets from the High Sheriff' (and those tickets were liberally and considerately distributed to all persous who had indispensable business, including all who were in attendance for the public press) were admitted by Mr. Higgins, the Governor of the Castle, and allowed to take their places in Court. At 20 minutes before eight o'clock, the gene. ral admission of the public was permitted, and the rush was great, but the spacious area of the Court was sufficient to provide standing room without much personal inconvenience to the parties who composed the throng. Some undefended causes were heard until nine o'clock, when Edward Gibbon Wakefield appeared in Court, with his father (the late candidate for the birrough of Reading), his uncle, the Chancery harrister, and his solicitor. The Rev. Dr. Davisalso entered the Court, but his daughter, Mrs. Edward Wakefield, was not present. William Wakefield was brought into Court, by an order from Mr. Baron Hullock to the Governor of Lancaster Castle, who had him in custody for debt, in consequence of a writ which had been executed upon him since his arrival to take his trial The two younger Wakefields were fashionably dressed, and took their scats near their counsel.
